1. Public consultation

Improved Site Notices could be better, the same as in respect to any other building work or development. It should be incumbent to Identify stakeholders, hold open meetings and make it necessary to demonstrate community awareness of the project. It should be a requirement to prove community engagement.

2. Environmental Impact Assessment

It should be necessary to ensure a study is done to recognise the impact on the natural environment, indigenous species, and tourism. This study should be independent and Impartial of any stakeholders.

3. Appeals and Renewals of licences
